
We had a good turnout for the lower Spanish Creek trail clearing even


## June 14th Trail Clearing

## "Breaking" the Young Horse

I bought a half-Arab (but mostly Arab genes, I think) a few months ago, about 3 years old. And I have a sixyear-old grandson with red hair and a constitution to

go with it.

I have been mildly worried for many weeks now about how I was going to "start" that horse. I have no training in horse training, in fact I'm a bit on the lenient side when it comes to riding, let alone training.

Lance the grandson has recently taken a personal, unprompted interest in the young colt, named Colstrip, because of his charcoal gray overall with black stripe down his back. And Lance goes out and pats him and sometimes feeds him apple-flavored treats, but mostly, he just schmoozes him and the colt likes him back.

Colstrip is halter-broke, and he'll tolerate a saddle and pigeons flying out of the barn over him without blinking. But he's never had a soul on his back.

This morning I was standing out on my back porch while Lance was waiting for his summer school van to pick him up, and I looked out to the barn gait, and there was Lance climbing up to say something to Colstrip. Then he just kind of eased over to the horse, keeping both hands on the gate still, and slid onto the horse's back, let go with one hand, and then, after a few seconds, let go with the other hand and sat there, with a nice easy natural seat and a mild smile on his face—totally at ease with a horse who just kind of stood there, too, turned his head a little one way, checking out this being on his back, then a little the other way, and stood there with his ears forward. The little five-minute scene was quietly thrilling to see, a totally natural relationship between a very young man and a young horse—neither one of them too concerned. So much for "breaking" a horse.

## **Now a Report From Weed Control**

I was pleased to see the turnout for our first club work on Spanish Creek trail for this year. My main contribution was to pack water bars up to our new trail above the "rock". On the way up I had the GPS on and mapped the trail and noxious weeds. I marked a waypoint for Houndstongue just below the junction to Pioneer Falls trail. Also in that same area there was a moderate cover of Stickseed (Hackelea patens) with their innocent looking blue flowers that will soon turn into Stickseed burs. Stickseed isn't on the noxious weed list. It's obvious that hikers or horsemen have spread this pesky weed along the trail as they did Houndstongue.

The previous day Jean and I were camped at the Spanish Cr Trail Head campground. Early in the evening I mapped noxious weeds. Houndstongue, Whitetop, and Musk Thistle were mapped. Between curious people and the thunder storm, the mapping didn't get finished. My curious visitor was more interested in my camper and mules than noxious weeds.

There are three obvious characteristics that distinguish Sulfur Cinquefoil from our native cinquefoils. Can you name all three? For the answer see p. 27 of the handout, *Montana Noxious Weeds*. I had to use all three characteristics to decide that the cinquefoil at the trail head was a native species. Well, that's all, and let me know if you spot some noxious weeds along one of our trails.

Sat, June 29 proved to be a very successful weekend for the Spanish Creek lower trail clearing. The 1<sup>st</sup> group loaded and packed 10 water bars up towards the Spanish Lakes. The 2<sup>nd</sup> group dug and shoveled gravel into buckets and loaded them onto packhorses to re-grade the "turnpike." The 3<sup>rd</sup> group cleaned water bars, installed new, pruned and cut back old timber from trail. Lunch was served in the rain under dripping trees added with a spice of hail. Earlier in the week, the trailhead received new tie rails, feed bunk repairs and plans were to paint them this day. Bettye and Bonnie arrived ready to paint, but had to wait for wood to dry from the rain the night before. While waiting, they pulled noxious weeds, filling a large leaf bag, then proceeded to paint.

On Sun., next day, Wally, Ed and Beth braved another day, a long one, and finished what the 3<sup>rd</sup> group was unable to complete on water bars, pruning and cutting back timber. On Mon. Betty finished the painting at the trailhead, working for 5 hours. What a bunch of hearty and willing workers we have in this club. Jiffie Hale
