On August 5, seven Bridger trail crew members rode History Rock trail #424 over to South Cottonwood #422 to clear deadfall at the request of the Forest Service. History Rock had been cleared by BCH previously, but already there were three or four new, and major trees down.

All part of a program to preserve the species of pine which is losing population due to a disease.

Cherry Creek cabin trail clearing: 8/12, 8/13. Some clearing was done on the way from Ennis Lake to the F. S. cabin. After lunch at the cabin the work crew was then split into 2 groups, 4 members cleared trail 401 from Cherry Creek cabin to jct. 401/408 . They then rode out on Tuesday and cleared the south portion of 408 toward Cherry Lake until one riding horse cut his foot in some rocks and it was decided not to proceed further up the trail. Trail 408 is used mostly by elk hunters, and is full of blowdown. The other group of 5 rode the old road both days blazing and building cairns to mark the way. They reached the last ridge before dropping down into Cherry Lake but couldn't complete the project in the two days. Lotsa rocks to move folks.

I think now is the time to applaud the efforts of all the hard working people who worked on the trails this year. As you can tell from reading their reports they really toiled. Thanks to all of you!



**Hyalite Divide Ride** 

On Sat. Aug 10<sup>th</sup> fourteen members of Donna, Bob, Lori, Read family of 4, Neal, Jack, Sharon, Sammylu, Bettye, Chick and I rode the ride of the year, thanks to Chick. However, we all found that he can lie, even to me, his wife. Chick told us that the drive to Butte Meadows, the trailhead, was 9 miles. It was 12. He also did not tell us of rock on the trail. He said, "If I told you those things you wouldn't have come." Probably. The weather was perfect. We expected it to be cool when we reached the top; it was warm. We expected it to be windy; there was a slight breeze. After negotiating 23, count that, switchbacks before reaching a long open trail in a large cirque which took us up and along the side of the mountain, traveling on rock, we reached the summit. It had been a few years since Wally and Chick had ridden the trail and much erosion had taken place on the old timber road area. There was evidence of rockslides on the upper area of the trail, but we managed plow through.. Why is one stirrup always 1 inch shorter than the other - no matter how many times you adjust them?


