# **President's Report**

Thank you to the 25+ people who attended the January 19th meeting and helped us draft the 2006 schedule of events, projects and rides. Janice Cartwright facilitated an interactive session that allowed everyone to make suggestions. Thanks Janice. Several new trail bosses have agreed to help with rides to new places.

At our February board meeting we will be working on how we can more effectively communicate with our membership and those who might like to be members. I know you will be reading this after the fact but I want you to share your ideas with any of the officers or directors. I have heard some interesting things about what keeps people from joining our ranks or participating in our events, projects, etc. One person shared with me that they did not think you could join the club or participate if you did not have a horse. This is not what we want people to think. We presently have members who do not own a horse but would like to someday. They are here to learn from our experienced cadre of horsemen and women. That is part of what we are about.

We also invite any club member (men, women and youth) to participate in our projects. There are all kinds of tasks on any project. We try to match tasks with people's comfort level or what they might want to learn. These projects are a great place for on-the-job (OJT) training. I share this with you because we want to replace rumor with fact, and invite everyone to come join us in the backcounty.

# **Rules of the Ride**

**WHO** All breeds and sizes of equines, equestrians, guests and pedestrians are welcome. Join us decked out in the tack style of your choice. Dogs and Stallions are NOT permitted on club rides

**REGISTER** Members and guests sign the Trail Boss's ride register and waiver acknowledging the Montana Equine Law which states that horse activities are inherently dangerous and that riders accept this danger while engaging in equine events.

**HELP** We love company on the trails that we have committed to clearing for the Forest Service. Trail work is scheduled mid-week and on weekends. The formation of new work groups is encouraged. Tools are provided, but riders should bring work gloves, water, lunch and their favorite hand tools. It's a lot of fun. Try it, you'll like it.

**CARPOOL** Share a ride: save money and reduce parking congestion at the trail head. It's fun and helps others with no way to get there.

**PREPARE** Horses should be taught to stand quietly while tied or hobbled. Please flag the tails of horses that kick, and maintain a horse's length between your horse and the horse ahead of you.

**TRAIL BOSS** Contact the Trail Boss ahead of the ride for details, locations and times. Arrive in time to saddle up and be ready to depart at the appointed time. The Trail Boss will ask for volunteers to carry the Human and Horse first-aid kits that accompany every ride. Please notify the Trail Boss if you must leave the group. The Trail Boss knows the trail and will lead or appoint a leader as well as describe the trail for riders. Offer or ask for help whenever needed.

#### TRAIN Be prepared.

\* The Forest Service requires certification for chain saw and cross cut saw use, as well as the practice of first aid. The Forest Service encourages trail workers to carry bear spray and provides training.


\* Horse Safety Training is offered on April 22, 2006, and everyone is encouraged to attend, but it is not a requirement for participation, though someone in every group must have training.

#### Part 1:

Hitch the team of horses to the sled. Hitch the sled to the truck with the pipe over the rope as described in the last installment (January edition of the Newsletter). *Figure 1*. **CAUTION**: it is VERY IMPORTANT to assemble these driving elements in a straight line. The following diagram illustrates what happens if you select a more artistic arrangement and the truck tires are stuck in the snow.

#### Part 2:


It's time to check for broken limbs and ribs, set the sled upright and go looking for the horses. The horse may well have scraped the mule off on the gate as they passed through. There are now two trails to follow. *Figure 2*. **WARNING**: The failure of the truck to move, combined with the scraping-off action, contributes to doubletree failure. The laws of compensation, however, provide that you now have the makings for two singletrees where once you had only one doubletree.



#### Part 3:

Now its time to try a different pairing: this time it will be two mules, Speed and Grace. Time to apply a little ground time to the pair, just to make sure that all parties are on the same page. Wally has a nice 20-acre parcel and sets off for a couple laps on foot. *Figure 3*.

**WARNING:** Watch your footing, 'cause you wouldn't want to take a spill and fall down on the job in the middle of the first lap. See figure 3.
