And Rich Inman offers this wisdom on:

How to Keep Your Horseshoer Happy When everyone wants their horse shod yesterday, keep these tips in mind:

- Plan ahead and schedule your Horseshoer well in advance. It is best for your horse to wear his shoes at least 5 days before a big ride to help prevent stone bruises.
- 2. If you think your horse might be unruly, advise your shoer to allocate a little extra time and not make him/her late for the next appointment. Also, advice the shoer about special shoeing

- needs so he can plan extra time and materials as necessary.
- 3. If it has been raining and the ground is muddy, provide a dry well lighted place in which to work.
- 4. Catch your horses before hand so that the shoer can get right to work.
- 5. When you pick a location for shoeing, remember that your shoer needs to drive his truck nearby. If you don't have a safe place to tie your horse, plan on holding your horse while it is being shod.
- Do not expect the horseshoer to train your horse to stand still. Break barn sour horses on your time, not the shoer's.
- Start working those foals when they are young.
   Teach them to pull their feet forward and accustom them to pounding on their feet.
- 8. All though few people do, teach your horse to mover over when light pressure is applied to its sides.
- After long dry spells, hooves get hard. Pen your horses in a muddy place overnight to soften their hooves.
- 10. Shift your horse's weight off the foot the shoer is going to pick up, by controlling the horse at the head.
- 11. If your horse is kept stalled he will stand better if he has been exercised and has eaten before the shoer arrives.
- 12. In appropriate seasons, you can make the job easier and more pleasant for everyone if you apply fly spray before the shoer arrives.
- 13. Pay the horseshoer at the time of completion of the job. If you wish to pay later, discuss arrangements well ahead of time.
- 14. On hot days, the horseshoer gets thirsty and hungry, too.

The better the conditions you provide for your horse-shoer, the more likely he/she will be willing to accommodate you in an emergency. Although some horseshoers are known to be habitually late, planning, horse training, and working with your shoer will result in a better and long-lasting relationship. This all applies to your veterinarian, too.

# **Horse Trailers**

Our guest speaker works with Sport Land Manhattan
(formerly Bitterroot Trailer Sales). Justin provided
some great information and tips on trailer maintenance and safety. Sport Land started out with their
original store in Lolo, MT nine years ago and they
also have a store in Kalispell. They sell and service
Sundowner, Trail West, Featherlite and Charmac
trailers as well as a number of other brands.

When hooking up your trailer, make sure the couple and ball fit well together and that the pin is in. You should apply a thin coat of wheel-bearing grease on the ball, as needed. Make sure your trailer sits levelly when fully hooked up and that all your lights are in good working order. Make sure the pin holding your wheel/drop-leg is in good working order (not held together by wire, etc). Your break-away battery should be checked annually.

Check tires frequently for wear and air pressure. The tires should be rotated every 5,000 miles and your wheel bearings packed annually or every 12,000 miles. If you axels are in need of aligning, both Midwest Industries Inc. & Tom's Alignment Center can service horse trailers locally.

Most horse trailers have an aluminum or wood floor with rubber mats on top. When traveling with your horses, put wood shavings down to absorb moisture. Clean out the manure and wet shavings when you unload your horses. Every three months the mats should be pulled out and the floors cleaned with soap and water. In the winter, slide two 2x4s under the mats to allow for circulation. Your mounting bolts, frame and welds should be checked annually for wear and rust all around and under your trailer.

All the doors, roof vents, windows and dividers of your horse trailer should be checked regularly to ensure they open and close properly. Clean & grease hinges as needed and make any adjustments if they are not closing properly. Bumpers on the walls and dividers should be in good condition. Face guards are strongly recommended if you have drop-down

windows, as well as butt and breast bars, for safety reasons. Justin also recommends using trailer ties to secure horses in the trailer rather than lead ropes as the lead ropes can become untied, hang out the window and get wrapped around a wheel, causing injury to your horse. Fly masks are a good idea to prevent any sawdust or debris swirling around in the trailer from getting into your horses' eyes.

If you have a water tank in your trailer, ensure that it is securely anchored. There is nothing worse then soggy tack!

On the outside of your trailer, the tie rings should be firmly attached and free of sharp edges. The bumper pads where you unload your horse (rear or side of trailer), should be in good condition so your horse doesn't cut a leg entering or exiting the trailer.


