


R.O. BROOKS APRIL 19 PROGRAM

CHAIN SAW SAFETY APRIL 19 PROGRAM



Larry Thomas, chain saw safety for clearing trails

Carl Smith, author of Chain Saw Safety Training Guidelines:

If you place your hands on a chain saw, you must keep in mind that it is like grabbing a hand grenade without a pin in it. It is very likely to go off in your face. From the moment that you take it out of storage to the time that it goes back to the same place, you can be hurt by either it, or by whatever you will be cutting.

The chain saw is the most dangerous hand tool that can be purchased on the open market. It requires no license and no training to own or operate it.

Carl Smith described the chain saw as "...the most dangerous hand tool that can be purchased on the open market." Every year over 165,000 people are injured while using chain saws in the U.S. Chain saws are relatively common and may seem simple to use, but using a chain saw, clearing brush, and felling trees are operations that require training and proper safety precautions. Logging is among the most dangerous professions, and if it is dangerous for professionals, amateurs should consider carefully their need for training before buying and using a chain saw.

Most chain saw accidents are preventable. The only answer to reducing these accidents is proper training and knowledge with a lot of time using a saw - which is experience.

[—] Carl Smith is a fifth generation logger who received a forest technician degree from Green River. Carl started his career with The Weyerhaueser Company. Smith eventually went to work for the United States Forest Service where he trained employees of the National Park Service and Bureau of Indian Affairs.

LETTER FROM BRAUCH & BUCKNER SACAJAWEA MIDDLE SCHOOL


